Precious Items are Gifts

When the Town of Walden acquired the McCoy property, the house had been cleared of furniture, and the rooms reflected the forlorn emptiness of the family home. Though the Town replaced the roof, painted the house, and installed climate control and security systems, the house still needed much more attention and some loving care.

Mayor Trohanis asked Anne Leonard to be on a McCoy House Committee before there was an official McCoy Farm & Gardens Board of Directors. Gene Adams, Linda Davenport, Clare Hetzler, Susan Jensen and Mary Beth McClure soon joined her. Their main job was to coordinate kitchen and bathroom redesigns and approve the furnishings. They also set to work cleaning and refurbishing the interior. There were many, many steps along the way dealing with the physical conditions of plumbing, wiring, walls and floors. But the joyous part of their work came when they began to receive gifts from those with a connection to the house and Bachman-McCoy family.

Offered early on were the 1914 law books of Judge Bachman. Mrs. Hyde had stored the books in her home in East Ridge since the death of her husband, Bachman's last law

partner. When she saw an article in the *Chattanooga Regional Historical Journal*, she called the editor, LaVonne Jolley, who picked up the books and returned them to the house.

Amy Hoover Frierson saw in the paper that the McCoy property was being readied for the first Memorial Day picnic. She called Susan
