During this time when health concerns have put events at McCoy Farm & Gardens in abeyance, many physical improvements have been made to the property. We hope you will enjoy this series of pictures showing ongoing accomplishments.

For the Main Entranceway at Taft Highway

Bob Franklin, of Franklin Architects, graciously provided drawings for an improved and more important looking entrance that reflects the original historic gateway on Anderson Pike.

The small existing stone pillars were increased in height, and wing walls similar to those on Anderson Pike were added. White fences along the drive will lead the eye to two new interior stone pillars that support a
