Hold Your Event at MFG



Putting Two Gardens to Bed

November was a "big" month for me at two special McCoy Gardens – the plots at the



serpentine wall and near the screened porch. Over the past few weeks I have been cleaning out the summer plants as they have died. First the zinnias, where I pick off the dried flowers

and drop them on the soil for next year's seeds.

I finished weeding the first crop of winter weeds, the varieties that germinate in the cool fall weather, and, if left alone, would grow all winter and cover the garden. A big problem of leaving them is that the winter weeds develop a huge web of roots which pull out a lot of the top soil when they are removed in the spring. These must be cleared all through the winter.

Several of the perennial flowers are looking good. Most needed to be cut back for the winter. The bee balm and cone flowers are ready for their growth spurt in the spring. The lark-spur seeds dropped from last spring's flowers are germinating and will develop roots, making the plants shoot up and bloom in May.


Before long we will start to see the shoots of all the daffodils. The garden never rests. And woe to the gardener who thinks he can take the winter off to rest.

Also, today was the day that the winter pansies went in the garden next to the screened porch. They will provide color until next May when the hot weather will eventually do them in. So with a little care, these two gardens have been winterized and put to bed.
