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Boxwood Restoration

The Boxwood "maze" is an intriguing area for many. Kids love to play hide-and-seek there, and brides like to use the aisle formed between rows as an entry point to the lawn.

The boxwood (*Buxus*) variety at MFG can grow very big over time. Since they were not pruned properly for many years, our plants had become so overly large and crowded that their formal spacing had almost disappeared. Rejuvenation, or hard pruning, was in order. This process involves cutting back the over-

grown central woody stems by 1/3 each year over a period of 3 years or more.

Beginning in 2019, board members Larry Mick and Karen Stone set about reducing the 32 old boxwoods by 1/3. For four years they have worked when the end of winter meets the beginning of spring, just before the new growth appears. They have also removed invading privet, bittersweet, briers and English ivy. Perhaps you have been disturbed to see the radical cutting back and wondered what was going on. If you visit the maze now, you can see how the plants are responding.

According to local lore, at the time when the crocuses open or the forsythia blooms, you can prune your own boxwoods. Fortunately, now is the right time. To learn all about boxwoods, try the Boxwood Society http://www.boxwoodsociety.org/
