Gardens Status Update

After many years of neglect, the McCoy formal gardens had grown up with invasive plants and trees. Since 2009, volunteers have given over 2,500 working hours to restoring them, beginning with the first few years devoted to removing the many undesirables.

The McCoy Farm and Gardens Monarch Waystation/Cottage Garden has been four years in the making and is now complete under the able leadership of Linda Andrews, Hilda Horton and Jody Hunter.

In 2014, Lead Tennessee Aquarium horticulturist, Charlene Nash, designed a layout for the formal gardens. Jody Hunter obtained a grant from a local foundation. These funds were used to purchase necessary tools, trees, plants, shrubs, mountain stone, fencing mate-



rial, organic supplements for both plants and soil, mulch, and professional botanical labels.

Work included digging out old bricks and rubble, pruning trees properly, transplanting existing plants, installing new plants, shrubs and trees, edging the beds with mountain stone, making and installing fencing, pulling weeds, mulching, watering, and labeling.

During that time the horseshoe shaped gardens became an official Hamilton County Master Gardening project. The gardens are designed to provide butterflies and other pollinators with food and shelter among over 100 plant species, many of which are natives.

It has been suggested that the project should apply for an International Award for Excellence. The gardens are a living example of environmentally friendly practices that *continued on page 2*
