Congestion at Taft Entrance

At the main entrance on Taft Highway you will soon see stone masons, road builders, and others working to improve the appearance and functionality of this area.

We regret that the activity may cause you some inconvenience in accessing the trail over the next several weeks. There will be periods when the Taft entrance will be temporarily closed for your safety. At those times you may need to use the Anderson Pike entrance.

The Anderson Pike drive was not designed for modern cars, and we ask you to use it gently and with caution. Follow the gravel drive to the right at the house and continue to the horse ring parking lot. Please respect the hard work that has gone into restoring the lawns and do not drive or park on the grass.

An expanded new trailhead parking area has been designed as part of the Taft entrance upgrade and will be available soon after the work is completed. The drive will be widened and improved with a generous apron at the highway to make the area attractive and safe.

The stone pillars are being restored and new wing walls similar to those on Anderson

Pike will be added. More white fencing will enhance the drive and lead to an interior gate and a second set of stone pillars visible from the highway. These features will greatly improve appearance, functionality and design of a revitalized and inviting main entrance.

Plans are to have the entrance open on weekends during construction. Weather and the availability of contractors will dictate times when it must be closed.

Tree Work to Close Anderson Pike on July 6

Road will be CLOSED to traffic all day on Monday, July 6 Detour via Miles Road

For one day, Anderson Pike will be closed to traffic, and motorists should avoid the area or allow time to detour along Miles Road.

The closure is necessary because trees will be felled across the road near the north-west corner of McCoy Farm & Gardens. This portion of the property is know as the Emma Bell Miles homesite. Trees have been encroaching on the cut-stone wall that delineates the area. Roots have pushed the wall out and damaged it. Destructive trees will be removed, and repair of the wall will begin on following days.

Reconstruction of the wall will not necessitate closure of Anderson Pike. However motorists are cautioned to be especially

vigilant as they pass the area where the stone masons are working in an exposed spot on a dangerous curve.

In the past, cars have hit the wall causing some of the damage that is now to be repaired. The masons will obviously be vulnerable themselves. Please obey posted signs and drive carefully.

Extraordinary Garden Art

When volunteer Larry Mick began to reestablish the linear garden along what is called the "Serpentine Wall," he made an exciting discovery. Decorative bricks lined the outer edge. As he dug them out to realign them, he found the bricks had been set on a bed of concrete to prevent their sinking and moving. Evidently Martha McCoy had been a meticulous gardener who wanted a stable border.

This pleased Larry, since he is a meticulous gardener who had imagined a border like that he found. Carefully, he lifted the bricks one by one. Nexthe excavated the soil so that the bricks would be level with the ground when they were replaced. He then cleaned each one and

set it precisely into the original pattern along the 40-foot-long border. When you admire his cleome, zinnias, bee-balm, gladiolas, and legacy larkspur, admire the border as well.
