# The Family Tree

The next time you visit McCoy Farm & Gardens, you might want to walk down to the Pavilion and admire the stately willow oak that stands about 30 feet outside the double doors. This willow oak has an interesting history which was recently recounted by Sally McCoy Garland (the daughter of Martha McCoy) who now lives in Charlottesville, Virginia.

The history requires a brief review of another tree: the Bachman-McCoy family tree. Jonathan Waverly Bachman was the father of Nathan Bachman and Evalina Bachman (along with four other children). Nathan, of course,

was the father of Martha McCoy. Evalina was known by the family as Aunt DeDe.

Jonathan had a willow oak at his Chattanooga home on McCallie Avenue. Aunt DeDe took an acorn from Jonathan's tree and started her own willow oak at her home on Missionary Ridge. Later, Aunt DeDe took an acorn from her tree and started a willow oak for Martha. That tree is the one by the Pavilion.

Years later, Martha took an acorn from her tree and started a willow oak for Sally. Around 1990, when the young willow oak was about 2 feet tall, Martha gave the little tree to Sally, and that willow oak is now growing at Sally's home in Charlottesville.

When Martha transferred the McCoy Farm to the Town of Walden, she specified that the property would be used, in part, as an arboretum. Sally was pleased to learn that the stately willow oak by the Pavilion will serve as an important step toward that arboretum goal.

The Mission of McCoy Farm & Gardens is to restore, enhance and preserve the historic McCoy homeplace so that it may serve the community as an arboretum, natural area, and venue for public and private events.

### Wildlife Reports Informative

Two recent scientific evaluations of birds and plants at McCoy Farm & Gardens are informative. Kevin A. Calhoon noted 24 bird species in his extensive report. A highlight for his study group was hearing hooded

warblers in five different locations, each announcing and defending his own territory.

**Dr. Richard Clements** reported, "My primary impression from this trip was a surprising lack of spring ephemeral diversity in all areas of the property....I sus-

pect that past land-use practices, combined with an overwhelming density of invasive exotic species, has served to significantly reduce the springtime floral diversity of the area.... It may be some time before native species are able to reestablish from either remnants [of] vegetative structures, the natural seed bank (if it still exists), or natural seed dispersal from outside areas."
