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Horses at the McCoy Farm

In response to recent news, Kay & Joe Gaston wrote, "Great newsletter. Glad you have fixed up the barn! I remember Martha's donkey, who I think outlived all the horses. It was a great loss for her when he passed away. Who knows, someday you might have a resident horse (or another donkey)." These comments led us to believe there might be an interest in the horses, and the donkey, who used to live on these acres, and in the people who loved them.

Fortunately, Tommy Garland responded to our inquiry and wrote, "As young boys we had chores to do whenever we visited Danny (Grandmother Martha McCoy). My younger brother Shank and I would, each morning, race to the barn with kitchen scraps to feed the chickens, collect eggs and spend time with the small herd of old horses: Chief, Red and Donkey Grey.

"We were young pony riders in Charlottesville so we had no fear of the big retired horses. Unfortunately Danny did not have tack (bridles and saddles) so we didn't ride but always delivered carrots, peppermints and wa-

termelon rinds. Occasionally we'd also grab a couple of apples from the orchard but were wary of feeding too many to avoid stomach aches. Oh wait a minute - that was our stomachs and not the horses' !

"Donkey Grey was our fond Donkey Grey and the three grandsons: Johnny, Tommy and Shank.

furry friend. As an older nag she tolerated us brushing her and petting her enormous ears."

Ellis Smith, Jr. said in a recorded interview February 18, 2000, "Marthey loved horses, and she had a horse to ride all the time ... The field over where the white fence is - that, I believe, was made into a place [ring] where Marthey ran the horses – was a ten acre field where my dad grew hay to feed the horses. I can remember ... there was one [apple] as big as a grapefruit. We used to like to pick it up and feed it to the horses."

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Cliché Horror Film Setting

Students from Chattanooga State recently made a short film at McCoy Farm & Gardens. The shoot was part of the Professional Actor Training Program where students learn not only to act for the camera, but also to write for the camera, and to fill the functions of everyone behind the camera.

Rachel Burdyshaw, the screenwriter, lives on the mountain and chose the McCov house as the locale for her "cliché horror film." According to Sherry Landrum, Artistic Director of Theatre Programs at Chattanooga State, "The students loved it. It was a foggy, spooky day, and it made a perfect setting."
