Horses at the McCoy Farm

Martha McCoy loved horses, and she would sometimes lead young Priscilla Clayton and her friend, Alexis Moore, on adventurous horseback rides when the girls were about 13 years old. Priscilla tells a story that reveals the strong personality of Mrs. McCoy. The three were riding from Skyline Drive down toward Middle Creek when they came upon two rough men arguing. The younger brandished a large rock as he threatened to kill his father.

"Mrs. McCoy called him by name and said, 'You put that rock down. You will do no such thing!' He knew who she was; she knew him and his father, and she meant what she said. He put the rock down. He minded her! She

Robert Scholze. Mike became a TN Wildlife Resource Officer and was an accomplished farmer, blacksmith, farrier and horseman."

Helen McDonald Exum, in her *Chattanooga News-Free Press* column, August 27, 1972, wrote, "Martha Bachman McCoy remembers the Summertown Crepe Myrtle Festival, the square dances on Saturday night at the top of the 'W', and the fun of riding horses through the rustic and unspoiled woods. Although the Bachman place was on Anderson Pike and not in Summertown, there was a community feeling in the whole area of Walden's Ridge."

Mrs. Exum was expressing the sentiment that still holds true today. We hope McCoy Farm & Gardens promotes a community feeling in the whole area of Walden's Ridge.
