Hodgson Douglas Chosen to Develop Master Plan

After almost three years of renovation and rebuilding McCoy Farm & Gardens structures and rescuing many of the trees from vines, we realized we needed professional help to plan for the future. Thanks to a generous donation from a local foundation, we have hired Hodgson and Douglas, LLC of Nashville to create a Master Plan.

Hodgson Douglas' projects include the Tennessee State Capitol Bicentennial Mall, Vanderbilt University, Centennial Park and Nashville's Riverfront Park, and closer to home the University of the South, the Chattanoogan Hotel, Covenant College, and Chattanooga's Riverpark.

The McCoy Farm & Gardens Master Plan will consider how to manage projected growth, maintain existing facilities, maximize current sites and facilities, organize pedestrian and vehicular circulation, and create strategies for short and long-term land management and long-term planting. At the end of the process, we will have a prioritized "Action Plan" for implementation of our goals.
