Hemlock Rescue Action

McCoy Farm & Gardens has volunteers to thank in the effort to keep our Eastern hemlock trees from *woolly adelgid* infestation. The woolly adelgid is a tiny sap-sucking insect that will kill an affected hemlock within a few years. The woolly's white sacs have now hatched and their most active time of the year (winter) has begun for destroying the needles. Dan Reynolds, Mickey Robbins, and Wesley Nimon, together with Barbara and Clyde Womack, have continued the project with over 50 trees now protected for about 5 years when the treatment will need to be done again.
